We are looking for early-career historian-educators to develop decade-specific content for our new website aimed at Canadian history teachers in grades 7-12.

### This work involves:

- Writing short summaries of historical periods for our website
- Identifying and providing interpretive descriptions of 5-7 online archival sources, digitized artifacts, place-based teachings, and/or secondary interpretations (ie artistic representations)
- Identifying curriculum links for Canadian history and social studies courses

## You may be:

- A graduate student, postdoctoral fellow, or recent graduate in, or associated with,
   Canadian history or Canadian studies
- Familiar with diverse online archives across Canada
- Committed to researching, interpreting, teaching, and learning the history of Canada with (a) decolonial, antiracist, and feminist len(es)
- Experienced with writing for the public
- Comfortable working independently and meeting deadlines

## It would be extra great if you are:

- Bilingual (French/English)
- Aware of and experienced with grade 7-12 history/social studies curriculum
- Connected with/to the arts and/or land-based pedagogies
- From an interdisciplinary background
- Excited by exploring design and presentation for teaching and learning

We are looking for webpage content for each decade of the 20th century.

Our budget is \$500 per decade

with the option of hiring one person for multiple decades.

Work will begin March 30 for completion May 6 (dates can be negotiated)

### To apply:

**BY MARCH 27**<sup>TH</sup>: Please send a formal email outlining who you are and why you think you'd be a good fit for this project. Identify which decade(s) you are prepared to write about and the online archives you would start to work with. Attach a resume or CV and a writing sample that demonstrates how you are able to write for a popular or public audience. This writing sample can be a blog post, exhibit text, a news article, or a term paper.
